I worked with Charlie Boardman, site-lead, and he took charge of the home that we were building. It was wonderful working alongside Lisa Rigisich, Father Anthony Savas, Maria Soter and other dedicated, self-less and hard-working volunteers. All of the volunteers fundraise their trip fee which is used to purchase the materials to build the house for a homeless family in just five days! Additionally, proceeds directly benefit the boys at the St. Innocent Orphanage.



A "Face to Face" Connection

How can we stop the exodus of young adults from leaving the faith?

The statistics are staggering. 61% of church going teens are disengaged from the faith once they enter into their twenties. 70% of young adults leave their faith when they go to college. 35% of all 18 to 35-year-old Americans identify with "none" as their faith of preference.

Our youth do not know how to connect with God. They are bored of the mundane approach to spirituality. Orthodox Christianity is steeped in rich tangible tools to help us grow in God but unfortunately, sometimes our traditions seem too intangible. Offering incense, partaking

of God's flesh and blood, being forgiven through the sacrament of confession are all traditions that have been passed down to us through the Apostles.

These traditions are celebrated in Tijuana on the site of the largest Orthodox cross-cultural home building program in the world at Project Mexico. We open up a dialogue with God. Project Mexico brings volunteers "Face to Face" with the realities of poverty. Looking at the suffering of the families for whom we build and of the children for whom we care makes Christ come alive in our own lives by knowing Him tangibly through the needy.

Once they come to know Him then leaving His Church is not that easy. Project Mexico does not claim to be the cure of this lost generation. Christ is the only one Who can change the tides of abandonment of the faith. But Project Mexico can be a tool for the Lord in the 21st century so the young faithful can be challenged as they change lives and stand firm in their life in Christ. **+ Fr. George & Judy Marcus Leadership Program

FOCAL (Forming Orthodox Christian Adult Leaders)

Our new leadership program, FOCAL is sponsored by George and Judy Marcus. Every summer numerous young adults join us in Tijuana and intern as site leaders for the groups who come to build homes. They receive no pay and work long hours for weeks at a time. The interest in the program has more than doubled over the past decade and for this reason we have seen the need to develop and formalize a training program for these young Christian leaders.

Presbytera Merilynn Andruchow has lived at the orphanage for over a decade and is a graduate of Holy Cross Greek Orthodox Seminary. She is spearheading this new initiative. The Marcus Family Foundation is supporting this program for three years. The leadership curriculum for the next three years will focus on pre-service training, in-country education and post service follow-up.

Project Mexico is grateful for the Marcus' readiness to strengthen the Church's future leaders. This three-year pilot program will be the beginning of a much larger approach to capitalize on the energy of our young adults and to strengthen the overall evangelism of Christ's Church. •











Ranch Improvements

Our new general store, "The Tiendita" is fully functioning and was in heavy use for the summer Home Building season. The Tiendita is a building constructed of straw bales coated in a cob mixture of clay soil, straw, sand, lime and water. All of us here at Project Mexico are pleased with the way it turned out. It is serving nicely as a snack and souvenir shop, and a great place to hang out for all the summer volunteers.

The new septic system was built before the arrival of the 2019 interns. It served

approximately 35 people a day during the summer months.

In the coming months we should expect to see visible improvement to the Ranch landscape at St. Innocent Orphanage. We will be planting a large orchard of native, Mediterranean, and fruit bearing trees. Increases in our sustainability will also include a chicken coop to produce our own eggs—we consume 500 a week—along with fertilizer for our growing garden. • Thomas Ingram, Ranch Management



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
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Year of Service

Project Mexico is happy to announce its first formal year-long internship program which is available starting in January 2020. Participants will start in Eagle River, Alaska and will finish as Home Building interns in Mexico. Interns will go to Mexico in early May to prepare for the summer.

The program will be done in conjunction with OCMC (OCMC.org) and Saint John Orthodox Cathedral (stjohnalaska.org), which will provide a loving, supportive church community for the interns during their stay in Alaska. OCMC missionaries Michael and Jennifer Saur are bringing their immersive missionary experience from Project Mexico to Alaska to help set up and run the program.

Learning service development will include work at the Downtown Hope Center in Anchorage in addition to other social service agencies in Anchorage, Eagle River, and Wasilla. Work with the QCA Diocese of Alaska will be done as it becomes available. There will also be opportunities for Alaskan adventures (i.e. snowboarding, skiing, hiking, etc).

The cost of the program is \$1,000 per month and includes travel costs, rent, and a living stipend.
